## Feedback from Church Meeting

#### Discussion on Deployment of Ministry in the Wessex Synod

The Meeting split into discussion groups, each focusing on one of the suggested resources – either 'What is the Minister for?' or 'Dreaming Dreams'. The following is a summary of points raised:

#### 1. What is the Minister for?

Groups were first asked to list all the aspects of a minister's job that they could think of. They were then given the 12 cards and asked to sort them into least important and most important.

Groups were asked to consider what they would like their church community to look like in 10 years' time. The following is a summary of their ideas:

In discussing how best to facilitate this discussion, Elders – having read the Synod's introduction – noted with disappointment that the emphasis appears to be on managing decline rather than planning for growth.

## Christian Aid Appeal – Christmas 2021

Yes, Christmas now seems to be a rather distant memory; but at Park we managed some worthwhile things around that time of year. One of them was collecting for the Christian Aid Christmas Appeal.

This year the focus was upon the way that climate change is radically affecting the lives of families in Africa, particularly Sudan.

During one of our church services before Christmas we saw how, due to severe water shortages, mothers have no option but to give their children heavily contaminated water to drink.

The heart-breaking message was that families knew that the risk of serious illness, even death was a probability.

However, the more positive message is that Christian Aid, if given the money, can provide the expertise and local knowledge to create deep bore holes for fresh water to be pumped to the surface for communities.

Now families in these villages no longer have to live with the fear of drinking contaminated water, but they also have a plentiful supply for their livestock and crops, which helps them to go forward to the future.

So, thank you Park Church, you contributed  $\pounds 325$  towards the appeal this year.

## Church Secretary's Overview of 2020 and 2021

Dear friends,

I bring you this report following two years that have been so different to the normal life of Park. I don't think that at any time during the history of Park since 1908 have we had to close our doors to worship.

Following the Government announcement in March 2020. It was with tears in my eyes I had to put up notices saying that we were closed until further notice. In those first few weeks of lockdown, I don't think anyone could have foreseen what the following months would look like let alone years.

However, although our doors were shut we didn't stop worshiping together for a single week. Within days of the announcement people started talking about this mysterious thing called Zoom.

I can remember that first week when Rebecca Bullard led us in worship for the first time using "Zoom". It was just a short 40 minute service as that was the original time allowed. Much of that time was spent working out what buttons to press. We persevered and over the weeks and months became more proficient.

At the beginning of 2020 one of the things chiefly on our minds was moving forward with our Vacancy. We had been informed in December 2019 that someone had shown an interest in our joint profile with Hungerford URC.

In early January we were informed that that Minister had had to pull out due to a family situation. Within a few days we were told that another name had come forward and the joint vacancy group met with Stephen and we agreed to take the process forward.

We had planned a meeting with Elders and a chance for Stephen to visit Reading and Hungerford and even planned a date for Stephen to Preach with a view and to have a joint Church Meeting with Hungerford.

Then the government announcement changed all our plans. Luckily for us Synod and Church House found a way around the "normal process" so we would have to put everything on hold for maybe many months.

For the first time in URC history we were able to conduct a Preach with a view weekend online on the 10/11<sup>th</sup> May. Including, Bible studies, Worship, and Church meeting with question and answer sessions.

Following the views express by all those present at the joint Church Meeting, Stephen was appointed to be our Minister.

Once Stephen had completed his training in Cambridge we were able to plan for his move to Reading. This was delayed due to the restrictions in place at the time.

Stephen was Ordained and Inducted on the 4th September 2020. This service had to take place with a minimum number of people present in church but with over 120 online either by 700m or YouTube. It was a memorable occasion.

The use of Zoom has been great over the last two years and as we have gained more experience our technical expertise has improved greatly. As I have already said all our Sunday morning worship has been via zoom since March 2020.

We quickly added Ignite and Wednesday Morning prayers. We have been getting more people to these services than we used to get when meeting in the building. Many people have been able to join these services who probably wouldn't have been able to come to the building. Luckily many of our visiting preachers during the vacancy were able to lead our service from their own homes (or gardens in one case).

We were able to keep in touch with the majority of people by email and via the weekly "Mail chimp" newsletter.

Many, many thanks to Julia for all her efforts with the weekly letter, the orders of service and organising all the pulpit supply throughout the vacancy and over the last two years.

House groups were able to start meeting again on zoom but as restrictions have lifted they have been able to meet again either in people's houses or at Church.

Elders, F&GP and Church meetings were also able to meet on zoom but we have also been able to move to a "Hybrid" model where people can join in interactively both from home and in church.

For our Christmas service by Candlelight in 2020 we were able to get together a socially distanced choir and record all the carols for use in the service We benefitted from a grant from Synod to pay 50% of the costs of AV equipment to greatly improve the quality of these services.

In 2020 during Lent, as in previous years, we planned to hold a study course. Carrie had found a very good Mental Health based course called Lifting the Lid. Again due to restrictions we had to cut short the course but we were able to pick it up again and do it during Lent in 2021.

During the time that the Church was not being used we took advantage and went ahead with the plans that we already had to relocate the old Church Office and the Crèche. This work was completed in June 2020.

We were also able to paint the whole of the Church sanctuary. This was completed in July ready for Loraine (Bhebhe) Palmer's wedding in July. It was nice to be able to welcome Robert back just for the day to conduct Loraine's Wedding.

At the end of 2019 we had placed an order for a new digital organ to replace our ageing pipe organ. This was delivered in February 2020. It had to be temporarily installed until the old organ could be removed. Much work was undertaken by Simon to try to find a buyer.

Eventually a buyer was found. In March 2021 two Italian gentlemen arrived to carefully dismantle (pipe by pipe) the old organ and take it back to Italy. It has now been completely refurbished and installed in a Church in Sicily.

During 2020 our membership started at 102. With sadness Peter Short passed away in the beginning of February. Peter had been a member of Park for 64 years. He had served as an Elder and also on F&GP. Peter and is family had been very active members of the Church but in later years as his health declined we saw less of him. He was also a very keen supporter of the Scout movement at Park.

A few days after Peter, Pat Fuller passed away. Pat had not been well for quite a time. Pat was a member at Park for 22 years, when she first became a Member at Park she, and her husband Graham, who are both keen gardeners planned and designed the gardens at Park. We are still benefitting from her expertise.

In April, Geoff Cornell was rushed to hospital to operate on his colon to remove a tumour. Although the operation was 100% successful and he was expected to leave by the end of the week, he was not able to breath unaided and very sadly passed away on the 24th April. Geoff was originally made a member in October 1954, he transferred to Plymstock in January 1982 and back to Park in November 1983. Geoff was a very active member at Park always willing to help out. At the beginning of 2020 we had welcomed Geoff to serve as an Elder.

During 2020 we were unable to have any baptisms and did not welcome any new members. At the end of 2020 our membership was 99.

In 2021, with sadness Olive Goodchild passed away on 27th July following a heart attack. Anna had had to rush back from holiday to the Hospital, Stephen was there to meet her and to be there with her to see mum. Olive had been a member for 15 years. She was a regular member of the Friendship club and keen supporter of the Guides and Trefoil Guild as well as a regular helper at Messy Church. I am sure she is now at rest with John, her husband who passed away in July 2018.

In August I met Andrew Weston who told me he is now settled in a Church in SW London and would like to resign his membership of Park. In September it was with pleasure that we welcomed Justyn and Cerys Slatter as members by transfer from Wycliffe Baptist Church. They are both already very active within the Church, Justyn as an adviser to F&GP and Cerys has taken on the role of Flower Rota organiser.

At the end of 2021 our membership remained at 99.

The last two years have certainly brought their issues but we have faced them with the help of God and carefully progressed.

I would like to thank all the Elders who have supported me personally and all the fellowship during this time.

In 2020 Alistair Knox, Geoff Cornell and Rebecca Bullard joined the Elders meeting. Charlotte Blackburn and Enala Bhebhe stepped down. Sadly as mentioned earlier Geoff passed away in April 2020.

In 2021 Both Charlotte and Enala re-joined the elders meeting after a year. Elizabeth Knox, Alan Holms and Judith Enang were all elected to serve a second term. Rod King and Zie Bhebhe stepped down for 2021.

All our Elders are so important to the running of our church and the pastoral care that is provided. Especially over the last few years. It is a privilege to be called to be an Elder if asked I really hope people will feel willing and able to take on this role.

A lot of thanks also to Yvette Gayford our Treasurer and Rod for his assistance.

Thanks also go to Becky Joyce our Centre Manager it has been very difficult time to manage the lettings that we had and to ensure that the building was always used with care and personal safety in mind.

So many of our usual events we have been unable to do over the last two years but I'm hopeful that in 2022 we will be able to take them up again.

## Why I am not a Humanist.

As we put away the Christmas decorations, it is a chance to reflect, what was it all about? Not the details, the star or the shepherds but this God with us business, the baby come among us. What is Christianity is really about?

Or maybe the question is, what is Christianity about, in contrast to Humanism? Humanism- is unbelief- is atheism, as if humans mattered, being "for" something rather than just against. We humans are a great species able to fling a space telescope to orbit beyond the moon. The trouble is that we also can think that the Squid Game is an appropriate form of entertainment.

Humanism is the dominant belief system to the extent people express any belief system nowadays. (It is not the main reason churches are in the main empty- but it provides intellectual cover.)

It says, "Look, a Creator God is illogical. If you need a Creator to create everything, what created the Creator"? But this ignores the same assumptions in humanism. What defines the root laws of mathematics, logic and physics on which everything is based? The problem is the same.

Humanism tells a good story. Brian Cox in his BBC television series "the Human Universe" shows the grandeur of scale and time involved as far as modern science has taken us. He gives us the usual photogenic tour of the cosmos interspersed with scenes of human life as he considers humans to be the "source of all meaning" in the universe.

He does this after explaining that the universe has been around a very long time before us and there are whole areas of the universe that are simply too vast for us to explore. Yet, without any sense of irony, despite our insignificance, he feels humans inject "meaning" into the entire universe.

And what does "Meaning" even mean in that sentence?

Humanism seems to say, "look at Science- haven't we done well- we must be important." I love science, as maybe you notice, but it tells me a very different story.

Brian Cox and modern science describes a world of great beauty and to use Richard Dawkin's comments, inspiring of great awe. Despite the stunning pictures from space telescopes or detections of gravitational waves, cosmology is speculation until backed by experiment and observation. And mostly, it's not going to affect us at all. No one encounters black holes walking down Wokingham Road though it would enliven a journey on the No 17 bus.

We can have awe at the beauty of creation from the smallest bird to the most distant planet but in the end Brian Cox has to admit that all these systems are going on a world in complete lack of care and concern for humans and their well-being. The maths just doesn't allow humanity to pop out. It describes a rational, mathematical universe unsentimentally chugging on to a grey, uniform entropy death not to a peak in human civilisation. Brian Cox can only call on Carl Sagan: "For small creatures such as we, the vastness is bearable only through love."

Wait a minute! Where did that come from? It may be loving, but is it rational, Mr. Spock (as they used to say in films)? So, this isn't that rigorous at all! And this is the best unbelief can do after 200 years of so-called Enlightenment!

When we look around in the world today that are examples of astonishing love, like the now forgotten stories of the Brazilian women caring for new-born children crippled by Zika virus. Or the care of challenging foster children. The maths of self-interest don't tell you to bother! Yet, day after day people do this. People, you are a mystery.

We will not hear of a big experiment discovering a love particle. There is a limit to science. It can tell us what is therebut it forgets that it does not understand why. It is like understanding the mechanism of a kettle and claiming therefore to know why it has been switched on. Humanism claims to be able to answer that why yet so often trips itself upsuch as not understanding the revulsion against live animal experiments.

It is not to say that much of the time humanism does not get you by, like the humanist doctor focusing on curing her patient. But it is also capable of horrific misjudgements, making morality had become narrow and transactional, without thought to wider issues of respect.

But what is the essence of the Christmas story? The first gospel writers wove their story of shepherds, wisemen and stars. But Saint John writing later, had a lifetime to reflect and strip away the shepherds and the manger. Christmas was for him not about any of these things.

It was about a loving divine being, desperate to express its love to its creation. A being that could set two black holes on collision and be unsatisfied. A love so intense it could not sit alone but needed to express its love to a Creation that could respond – and yet with the maturity of love to let that Creation have the free will not to show that love in response.

This is the great insight holds Christianity above its peers and is our challenge to live up to. As St John writes, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word became Flesh... full of grace and truth" We still live in the shadow of these words.

A humanist in the end has no ultimate values: good and bad for them are a matter of taste and what can be got away with. You need an Ultimate being, to define ultimate Good and Bad. We have a Source, a Guide and a Goal. The path may be muddy and the goal unclear, but there is one.

To misquote the psalmist, "I look up my eyes to the heavens, from whence shall my sense of right and wrong come?"

## Looking Back at 14 Years as Secretary

In this magazine you can see my 14th Annual report as Church Secretary, and as I step down from that post I would like to take this opportunity to review some of the key things over the last 14 years.

In **2008** we were celebrating out 100 year Centenary, our byline for the year was "Celebrating the Past Building for the Future." .. I think we still are. The year was celebrated by inviting many of those who had influenced Park over the years to come and lead worship. We also were able to enjoy many events during the year. In this year we were also presented with the "Child friendly Church" award. This is something we need to revisit.

**2009** Was a year of many "start-ups". A young people's house group was started. Agape this was run by the young people themselves for themselves. Unfortunately this initiative was not able to continue as the young leaders left to attend university etc.

This was the year we also started the Ignite Sunday evening services. These service were initially aimed at a 18 – 30 age range hoping to encourage students from the university. It still continues but the age range has expanded.

That year we also had a large group (45) of adults and young people who went to Spring Harvest in Minehead. This continued for a few years. With money bequeathed to the Church, Church meeting agreed to spend it on upgrading the sanctuary. We carpeted the whole Church and removed half of the pews. Church meeting agreed to remove the rest this year. We also installed a new projector and screen.

In **2010** many of the things previously continued, a large group went to Spring Harvest, in March we held a 12/7 Prayer Week. These have continued every other year. They are very special and many people are able to enjoy the peaceful reflective atmosphere.

A Pilots company was started to run alongside the Fizzang youth club.

**2011** was the year we installed the solar panels and the bio mass boilers. The pay back from these since that time has been nearly £100,000. We continued to hold Alpha courses.

In July we had a Church Camp at White Mark Farm, Watlington attended by over 40 people. These had continued every year. Hopefully we can return in 2022.

We increased our number of House Groups to 5, 3 are still running. House groups are invaluable to learning more about our faith and the Bible.

**2012**. This was the London Olympics year. It was also the year that a party of 22 went on a Mission to South Africa. It was wonderful time and a blessing to be able to share all that had been achieved in Siyabuswa, in Grace Christian School, Alathea Bible College and Hope Church. A small toddler group was started by Suzy.

**2013** Robert celebrated 10 years since his ordination and did a 3 month sabbatical tour of Reformation sites in Europe. Joshua Norris joined us for his final year placement.

Judith took on the toddler group from Suzy while she was away with Robert. The Toddler group exploded and continued to grow. Let's hope we can bring it back to its previous successful size. I know Judith would appreciate more helpers.

**2014** saw the development of new kitchen and new David's Hall. Probably the biggest development at Park since David's hall was built in the 1960's.

**2015** Robert had organized a pulpit exchange for a month and we were able to welcome Rev Rick King and family from Colorado USA.

We started Messy Church Services every 1st Sunday of the month. These were very successful and some weeks had over 60 people attending. A Monday Lunch Café was launched with the idea of making use of our new kitchen facilities. Unfortunately it didn't really take off.

**2016** Not much new in 2016, but Church Camp, Ignite, Toddlers, Messy Church, Prayer Week all continued from strength to strength.

It was the year that Read Collage starting to use our premises. The fact that Read have been able to continue with us for the last two years, working with the restrictions has been a significant help with our finances.

**2017** Robert informed us that he would be leaving later that year. Alistair stepped down as Treasurer at the end of the year.

**2018** Yvette took over as Treasurer, Rebecca Joyce took on the role of Centre Manager.

On all hallows eve Park held a Light Party for young children this was a great success and I'm sure it is something we will try to repeat.

Throughout this year we had a "Talent Scheme" This was the inspiration of and seed funded by Rod and Carrie. A variety of schemes were run during the year; cakes, crafts, cards, marmalade were made Anya produced a book of people's favourite pudding recipes (copies still available), Sally and Carrie walked the Mary Jones walk in Wales, Rod, Tony & Frances (2CQ) created a CD. A significant amount of money was raised to support our finances.

The First Friday Footpath Walk was started. On the first Friday of the month, starting in March, people met together to go for a short walk before ending up somewhere convenient for coffee.

We employed professional decorators to decorate the entrance lobby to the Church Halls. The Corridor down to the Ministers Office was decorated by a number of volunteers.

**2020** Rev Stephen Ansa-Addo joined us. With whom I have had the greatest of pleasure in working with.

**2021** I stepped down as Church Secretary

2022 Simon and Jenny take on role of Church Secretary.

These were just some of the edited highlight's year on year many of these new events have become regular events in our calendar.

We pray that there will be new initiatives, maybe some of the initiatives that failed can be rekindled. All of it you that have dreamed them up, it is you who have joined in to help, it is you who have come along and taken part.

Thank you for your support in the past. If we want these things to continue they will all need you support in the future. Maybe the "puff" club could be reborn.

Some membership statistics:

- 34 new members by profession of faith
- 26 transfers from other church
- 1 reinstated
- 36 deaths
- 17 moved to list B
- 3 resignations
- 11 transfers to other church

This gives an overall decrease of just 6 over 14 years. It was 105 at the beginning of 2008 and it is 99 at the end of 2021.

They say that across the UK denominational churches have been decreasing on average by 3% per annum. If that had been the case for us our membership would have been 71. So I think we have been doing very well and we certainly shouldn't be disheartened, it isn't all about numbers.

We have a strong fellowship who care both for each other and the world around us.

It has been a privilege to serve you for the last 14 years.
